Dave Brodhagen, a member of our club and our guest speaker July 26th, explained the process of writing and publishing his own books.

He told us that a personal's life experiences play an important part of becoming a writer and shared some of his background.

During his career he was a Project Manager and Master Electrician. Much of his career was with Sutherland-Schultz. He had the opportunity to work in various industries including hospitals, factories, & aerospace.

He also has hobbies that include woodworking, travel, hunting, and taxidermy. His first book was "A Hunter's Handbook", a non-fiction. Dave has also written in many magazines.

Dave's objective for the presentation was to explain the process of producing a book. His presentation was enlightening and entertaining. He explained the steps and choices made along the way in clear and simple way.

Dave says that the words in a book should draw the reader in, so the reader can feel it. His presentation certainly drew us into his story and all of us learned something.



His stories are Canadian, and his books are self published through Friesen Press a Canadian










company. The books are based on true facts, but the stories are fictional.


Rad Bazzul passed away on Thursday July 6, 2023 at Wellington Hospice in Guelph after bravely confronting cancer.
