Miles Lauzon (a hospital board member and past president of our club) interviewed Patrick Gaskin (President and CEO of the Cambridge Memorial Hospital).



This was a great opportunity to hear from Patrick Gaskin about major aspects of the hospital as Miles posed several questions.

Some of the topics covered included:

- Major renovations that have been going on since 2014 which are nearing completion.
- Positive result on the latest Hospital Accreditation audit.
- State of Ontario healthcare and staffing issues.
- Emergency room wait times.
- Hospital funding.

With every topic raised by Miles and all questions from members in the audience Patrick Gaskin responded with clear explanations. Both opportunities and challenges were described.

Patrick Gaskin had even brought props to illustrate the complexity of addressing emergency room wait times. The solution involves much more than the emergency room.

Clearly, the Cambridge Memorial Hospital is a vibrant full service, acute care hospital committed to providing exceptional health care to the communities of

Cambridge, North Dumfries and the region of Waterloo with a mission to "create healthier communities, together."

David grew up in Galt, attended St. Andrew's and Southwood Secondary schools. He enjoyed playing almost all sports and was co-president of the school before going on to earn degrees at Waterloo and Western, including a Masters in History.

As a 10-year-old he got to see Canada when his father drove him and his sister across Canada and down the Pacific coast, where he stayed with his cousins in Sausalito and in L.A. They returned on the old Route 66 from L.A. to Chicago.

Six years later he again drove across Canada, spending time with a friend of the family who accompanied them, a woman who had been Lady Churchill's lady-in-waiting, and whose later husband had been Winston Churchill's chauffeur. Great stories, and a possible future book.





At university, before an arm injury ended his sports career, he enjoyed playing varsity volleyball, and continued his painting that started in Jerry Weber's high school art class.

He began a career in journalism with the Cambridge Reporter under sports editor Carl Fletcher, then became sports editor of the Cambridge Times. He also began writing his first novel, "Terrier Town: Summer of '49" published by Wilfrid Laurier University Press in 2003.

Subsequent books and magazine articles followed, and he resumed his painting as he wound up his career in corporate communications with Siemens.



He continues to write and paint. Dave is just finishing up a book about the 100-year-history of Galt Arena Gardens.

Shortly after retiring from M.T.O., he went to work for Pioneer Seeds, and after 10 years, retired, sold the farm, and moved into village of St. George.


Harvey, a widower since 2019, has, 2 children and 3 grandchildren.
